


About the book:

Why "Head in the Clouds"?

In the original Spanish version of the book, the phrase "head in the clouds" is more closely translated as "birds in my head." This common expression refers to when someone has many ideas in their head, which may cause them to become distract ed. "Head in the Clouds" author, Rocio Araya, wrote this book when her children were two and four. She was fascinated with how they saw the world and fearful they might lose their childlike curiosity. Their wonder for the world inspired her to create this book.

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★ Questions for Active Reading ★

1. Throughout the book, Sofia asks her teacher many questions. What was your favorite question and why?
2. There are many birds featured throughout the book. What do you think these birds represent? How many birds did you see? What was your favorite?
3. Why do you think Sofia gave her teacher a bird at the end of the book? How do you think this made the teacher feel?

★ Questions for Reflective Reading ★

1. Phrases like "head in the clouds" and "birds in my head" are sayings to describe being lost in one's thoughts. Try making your own fun phrase to represent how getting lost in your thoughts feels like for you!
2. What are some questions you have about the world that are similar to Sofia's questions?
3. Sofia keeps her imagination and curiosity for the world alive by asking questions. What are other ways you can express similar emotions?
4. What does it mean to grow up while still keeping your imagination and curiosity for the world? What kind of grown up do you want to be?





The world to Sofia is very colorful
